Guest Manual

Accommodation

On arrival your holiday home should be spotlessly clean with all equipment functioning well. Should anything not be up to the required standard please contact “Atlantis Property Management” during office hours 10am-7.00pm 0034 952933870. If there is no answer, please leave a message and we will contact you.

Additional Services

Additional Services are available to make your stay more relaxing and enjoyable. Airport collections can be arranged, midweek cleans and laundry changes and babysitting are also available. These are to be paid directly by the holiday guest.

Appliances

When you arrive to this Holiday home the Property Manager who checked you into the apartment will familiarize you with the appliances that are available for use. If you are unsure please contact them by calling 0034 952933870 / 0034 617810209 / 0034 677114989

Breakages

On arrival you are required to pay a 300 euro key deposit. If there are any breakages, damages or losses then the amount will be deducted from the deposit. Only after the property has been checked, the deposit will be returned to your account, one week after the departure date

Should you have the misfortune to damage, break or lose an item that is in the holiday home, please report this directly to the Property Managers as soon as possible. We will then arrange a repair or replacement and advise you of the cost. All breakages are charged to the Holiday Guest.

Call Out Fees

If there is a genuine reason for a call out, and it is in regard to the property/contents, the call out fee is paid by the Property Owner. However if you have lost your keys or there is another reason then the call out will be paid by the rental guest

Cleaning and Laundry

The cleaning and laundry is paid by the rental guest. This price is often included in the rental price of the holiday accommodation.

For standard sized apartments the cleaning is 50 euros

For Laundry charges the price is 7.50 per person (bed linen and towels)

If you use additional towels then there are additional charges

The cleaning and laundry based on 4 persons sharing in a standard apartment is 80 euros.

For apartments that are larger the cleaning cost will be higher.

If you require midweek clean or additional laundries please contact our Property Managers.

Electricity

Electricity failures can occur quite often here in Spain. Sometimes the supply is restored within minutes by the Electricity board; sometimes it can take hours or even a day.

Normally the fuse box can be found behind a panel either in the Kitchen or the corridor entrance. When you are checked into the apartment, the Property Manager will highlight these areas. Should the electric “Trip” then go to the panel and turn all switches to the down position. Wait a minute then switch all of them one by one upwards. Electricity should then turn to normal. In the case that it does not you can call us on 677114989 / 617810209.

Electricity in Spain is now quite expensive. Many apartments are now requesting that the meters are read on arrival and on departure from the apartment. If an average consumption has been used then there are no extra charges. However if there is an over use of electricity from (for example continual use of air conditioning) then an additional charge will be made and deducted from the key deposit. The Property Manager will explain the average consumption when you arrive at the apartment.

Emergency Procedures

In most cases holidays here are without problems, however in the case of an Emergency please follow this guide.

Accidents

In the event of a car accident, please call your car hire company. If you have a personal injury or accident you can call for an accident on 061

Burglary or Theft

Please call the national Police on 091 to report it. If there is no report, there is no cover on the insurance. They may ask you to go to the nearest Police station to report it. Most Police stations have an interpreter or call us on 617810209 and we can arrange for an interpreter to assist you.

Water Leaks

Turn off the water and the stopcocks where the leak is occurring. Call us on 677114989/ 617810209 as soon as you can.

Security Alarm Problems

If your security alarm starts sounding without any reason please call the alarm company on the telephone number shown on the central alarm box. If you have set the alarm off by accident or you can't remember the code, please call us 677114989 / 617810209. There is usually a charge from the alarm company of 30 euros if the alarm has been set off accidentally.

House Rules

These are general house rules that apply for each apartment and community.

Noise -Please be considerate to your neighbors. Being on holiday can be fun but please consider that you are not the only persons staying on the complex. If you are staying in upper floors please be careful not to scrape furniture across the floor, or walk up and down the apartment in your high heels. If you are watching television or listening to music, please have it at an acceptable level (low) late at night (after midnight).

Washing -Please use the clothes dryers provided to hand you're washing. It is a community rule not to hang your washing over balcony rails or out of windows.

Smoking -If you are staying in an apartment that asks you not to smoke, please respect the wishes of the owner.

Insects -Occasionally in the summer months you may have a few visitors from flying or crawling insects. Please do not leave crumbs or food lying about as you may wake up with a hoard of ants enjoying your leftovers. If there are too many sometimes the property may have to be fumigated. The other insect that is a popular visitor is the over friendly mosquito! If you have any problems please call us 677114989 / 617810209.

Internet Access -Some properties have a Wi-Fi connection enabling you to read your e-mails. If you are not in this zone then ask a Property Manager and they will advise you to the nearest location.

Keys -Atlantis Property Management and Rentals ensure that they are there to meet you, to welcome you to the property with the key. The Property Manager will explain what each key is for. When you receive your keys, you will be required to pay a 300 euro key deposit. (This may vary from each apartment). The property Manager will meet you to collect the keys from you on the day/night of your departure. The key deposit is returned to you one week after the departure date. In the case of damages, breakages or an excess of electricity, then the amount is deducted from the deposit and returned to you.

Rubbish -Rubbish is pronounced “Basura” in Spanish. So where you see these signs, you will know to deposit your rubbish. Additionally look for the rubbish bins. In some areas the rubbish is divided into cardboard, glass etc.. Where this option is available, please help with the environment. Please empty your rubbish bins on a daily basis.

Security -When leaving the property to go out for the day/evening, or even for a short time, please ensure that all windows and doors are locked. Please also switch off any electrical appliance including air-conditioning units. **(Please do not use these units if you have the window open)**. Please ensure all windows doors are locked when you are not in the apartment. It is also beneficial to lock doors and windows at night when you are sleeping.

NB. No liability can be accepted by “Atlantis Property Management and Rentals” for the loss of a guests personal items from the property, howsoever caused.

Swimming Pool and Community Gardens -Having a pool and garden can be fun, but please remember that you are sharing this community with other people as well. Please do not take glasses to the pool area. Glass can break and cause damage if someone stands on it. Please do not change your baby’s nappy by the pool. Please do this in your apartment and ensure all dirty nappies are thrown in the bin. Please do not allow your children to urinate by the pool. Please use the toilet facilities provided. Please do not use the swimming pool after midnight. In some communities you are asked not to use the community pool after dark. Additionally you are not covered by insurance if an accident occurs in the pool after dark.

BBQ area -If a community BBQ is supplied by the community, please clean the BBQ after use. Remember the BBQ is to be shared. It is not fair for someone else to clean your

mess. If you are having a BBQ in the evening/late, please try to keep noise to a minimum so as to not disturb your neighbours.

Terrace furniture -If you have cushions on the terrace furniture, please bring them in in the evening as the dew can damage them. Occasionally a stray cat may also decide to rest leaving fur on the cushion.

Water -Tap water is drinkable, but if you prefer there are many bottles of water sold in the supermarkets.

Vacating the Property -Please try to vacate the apartment/townhouse/villa by 10am so that the cleaners are able to come in and clean the apartment for the next people arriving. If you are not leaving to the evening it may be possible to arrange to leave your luggage in a room, but you must leave the apartment to enable the next arrival to enjoy their stay.

Additional Cleaning costs -The cleaning of the oven and the barbecue area is an additional cost to the cleaning of the apartment. Therefore please either clean the oven and barbecue area after you have used it or pay an additional amount of 20 euros for the cleaning of the oven, or for the barbecue!

Cleaners have not got time to clean the oven and barbecue area on tight change-over's!!

Mid week Cleans -If you would like to book a mid-week clean, so that you can totally relax and enjoy your holiday.. This includes stripping and changing the beds, fresh towels (laundry prices are not included), tidying of kitchen and cleaning of bathrooms as well as sweeping and mopping the floor

Interesting near Places to Visit

Buddhist Temple – Stupa- Benalmadena



It is perhaps perplexing that an accomplished buddhist master from the Himalayas has, over the years, developed a strong connection to one of the most influential countries of the world, Spain.

Not only is spanish the third most spoken language around the world, but as a nation, Spain is also a major player on the world stage. Furthermore, the spanish peninsula is host to a myriad of cultural expressions. Buddhism being a philosophy of peace and universal dimension has made inroads in the country for over two decades.

The Buddhist master, Lopon Tsechu Rinpoche paid his first visit to Spain in 1990, where he gave teachings and empowerments to a large following at Karma Guen, a buddhist meditation center nearby Velez-Malaga. By 1994, in that same place, he built his first Stupa as a landmark of peace and prosperity for the country. That first Stupa served as a model for the next 16 Stupas he would build throughout Europe in the years to follow.

By 1995, Rinpoche became a spanish resident and began visiting the country regularly making his teachings more available to others. Rinpoche loved the country and its people.

And as a sign of the strong connection he had to the country, he began planning together with the Benalmadena Mayor, Enrique Bolín, the construction of the largest Stupa in the western world.

Fuengirola ZOO

History of the Zoo

In December 1998, Rain Forest took over the contract to operate the former site, conducting a radical refurbishment to create the first zoo fully designed in accordance with the very latest “full-immersion zoo” concept.

Taking advantage of the fine climate of the Costa del Sol, and bearing in mind the small size of the land available, one single ecosystem was chosen: the tropical forest.

The sub-tropical vegetation which grows on the coast of Malaga province served to re-create the tropical rainforests of Madagascar, Equatorial Africa and Southeast Asia.

A team of architects, builders, sculptors, painters and gardens set about making the visionary designs a reality, and over the course of two years the zoo’s appearance was completely transformed. All the fences and buildings disappeared; rivers and waterfalls sprang up, along with caves, valleys and rocks. The small size of the complex presented quite a challenge. Subterranean stables were built, deep canyons and raised gardens erected to screen off the nearby buildings. So the zoo grew upwards, giving visitors the impression of being within a much larger site.

Street Markets

Marbella Every **Monday** morning, ground close to the Car sales showroom area (poligono).

Puerto Banus - Every **Saturday**, market with car boot sale near the bullring, at the top end of the old town. A large affair with a wide range of goods on offer, especially antiques. The stalls spread in all directions. Be prepared for parking problems around the site. Far better to park at the bottom end of the town near the N340 and walk up (10 minutes). Lots of places to eat and drink around the market but becomes very busy at times.

San Pedro Alcantara - Every **Thursday**, market in the Divina Pastora District at the top end of the town. Quite a walk from the N340. There is parking near the market but can be a challenge. Reasonable sized market with clothes, shoes, fresh produce and the usual tourist stalls.

Las Chapas Every **Friday**, market at la Vibora area.

Mijas Costa Every **Wednesday & Saturday**, street market at La Cala de Mijas.

Estepona - Every **Wednesday**, market in town centre. Large and well organised with a great variety of stalls. Limited parking nearby. Get there early. Nowhere nearby for food and drink, you need to walk into the town towards the sea. **Sundays**, around the small port .Free near the Don Marino building.

Sabinillas - Every **Sunday**, market and car boot sale, alongside the N340 highway. Very large but disorganised. Late starter but bargains galore of every description. Parking is an absolute nightmare and by 10.30am the local police cordon off many of the roads. The N340 becomes a death-trap. Try parking in the Supersol car park or along the sea front

and walking 500m. Good Moroccan and Indian items plentiful. Nearby bars become packed very quickly. Every **Friday**, in the town, small local market.

La Linea - Every **Wednesday**, market close to the Gibraltar border. Massive and well organised. Every kind of bargain imaginable. Plenty free parking nearby. Few places for refreshments nearby.

Casares - Every **Friday**, market but only five or six stalls, mainly fruit and clothes. Parking non-existent. Walk into the town square for refreshments - very Spanish. Hardly any English spoken.

Fuengirola **Saturdays** and **Tuesdays** at Recinto Ferial (fair site).
Sundays (Winter/Spring) next to the Mosque, Summer/Autumn on the port.

Tivoli World, Benalmadena - Every **Sunday**

La Cala de Mijas

Easter Celebrations

Easter in La Cala de Mijas has become more popular over the last few years, largely due to continuing effort of both local and national brotherhoods together with the La Cala de Mijas Town Council. Previous years of financial struggle with organisation of these celebrations has been alleviated by an annual allowance supplied by the state.

Part of the festivities consist of a traditional "Saetas" singing contest, and because of the improvements that have been made through the years to the contests organisation, it becomes more and more popular year after year. It is staged in the La Cala de Mijas House of the Culture each year, and is also free to attend.

Fiesta de San Juan - 24th June 2007

As you would expect from an area which owes so much of its existence to the sea, the Fiesta de San Juan in Malaga involves the beaches and the sea.

It's no coincidence that the Fiesta de San Juan is held on the day of Midsummer Solstice as this is the day that countries all over Europe celebrate the longest day of the year.

The roots of the Fiesta de San Juan can be found in the Pagan Religion but in these modern times the celebration and parties are about an excuse for a good time!

The Festival gets going at midnight on the 24th of June with large caricatures being burnt on large bonfires. These bonfires are easy to find as there are many dotted up and down the Costa del Sol. Hordes of people gather around these bonfires jumping and dancing through the night.

At the stroke of midnight everyone enjoying the festivities runs to the sea, in the tradition to wash away the evil spirits and be granted eternal beauty.

Although traditionally midnight signals the end of the Fiesta de San Juan in Malaga this does not mean the party is over, all it means is that the festivities move to all the bars along the Costa del Sol. Even though you can experience the Fiesta de San Juan in any Costa del Sol town, the celebrations in Málaga are certainly one of the best, and it comes highly recommended. If you find yourself on the Costa del Sol during this time of year, it is well worth the trip to join the party.

Feria del Carmen - 16th July 2007

Virgen del Carmen, Protector of Seamen. On the night of the 16th July many people gather whilst an effigy of Carmen is paraded around the town destined for the mariner. Once there the statue is cast off in elaborately adorned boats, to a crescendo of horns and wonderful fireworks.

La Cala de Mijas Feria - During the 2nd Fortnight July (*dates may vary*)

During the 2nd fortnight of July everything in and around La Cala de Mijas begins to wind down and the entire town takes part in the annual La Cala de Mijas Carnival. Most businesses close for the second week out of tradition, and of course no one wants to miss anything. Local bars and restaurants serve food and drink in copious amounts, to the streets, full of the locals, whilst they enjoy the street musicians and various kinds of entertainment on offer.

The Ferial or local fair ground is the base of the annual fun fair. The local children look forward with anticipation to this event. The fair runs well into the early hours of every morning.

Christmas - 1st December - 5th January 2007/08

The Christmas festivities traditionally begin on the 1st of December with the introduction of each towns Christmas lights, and finishes with the Fiesta de Los Reyes, on the 5th of January. During the Christmas holiday there are many wonderful celebrations to mark the festivities, some of these are listed below.

- A traditional Christmas procession through La Cala de Mijas town.
- Children's Nativity Plays.
- Children's Carol Singing Contest.
- Various Christmas related competitions.
- Shop window dressing competition.
- Annual Choir Contest.

Seville: 2 weeks after Easter.

Takes place two weeks after holy week. You will have the opportunity to see the typical flamenco dresses, which almost all women, never mind their age, wear... Innumerable casetas, provisional houses, are built on the terrain and decorated with colourful lamps. In the morning arrive the landowners on horses or in horse-coaches. In the afternoon starts a great party of Flamenco and sherry-wine in each caseta that will take all the nightlong. That is repeated day by day during an entire week

Marbella: Second week in June

Feria de San Bernabe at Marbella. This colourful event is a riotous combination of flamenco music, parades of horsemen and women, of the typical dances of Andalusia, and of pop music for the young. Celebrations where the smell of orange blossom drenches the Plaza de los Naranjos, and citizens and visitors throng the Old Town's streets, squares and bars from early morning. Strangers shake hands to show their friendship and respect, toast each other with a glass of wine, and continue celebrating far into the night

Fuengirola: 6 to 12 October

Fuengirola's Feria and Fiesta del Rosario is held from the 6th to the 12th of October and features displays by horses as well as bullfights, flamenco dancing and other popular Spanish cultural activities.

Malaga

The second and third week in August for 10 days.

The fiery people of Malaga choose the hottest month of the year for their liveliest street party, a 10-day extravaganza of flamenco and "fino" (dry sherry) commemorating the Christian victory over the Moors in 1487. An explosive opener is provided in the form of a firework display, best seen from the port area, followed by a day of parading in the streets. Flamenco is the dress code, and the local version of the dance is performed in streets and squares of the centre, providing a diversion from the ample opportunities to eat and drink. The streets at the centre of the festivities are decorated with paper lanterns and flags, and all cars are barred, though there is no shortage of thoroughbred horses with haughty riders. Meanwhile, in the fairground at the edge of town, different organisations have set up their "casetas" or marquees, where the partying goes on in to the early hours amid ear-splitting music, funfairs, nightclubs and raucous merrymaking. The feria is one of the biggest in Europe and attracts millions of visitors each year

Mijas: Second week in September

In the first fortnight of September the fair of Mijas town is celebrated in honor of Our Lady the Virgin of the Rock - the Patron Saint of Mijas - with an ample program of culture, sport, musical and festive activities.

The celebrations start with a great procession of giants and masks and that crosses the main streets of Mijas, accompanied by bands and the queens of the fairs of Mijas, Las Lagunas and La Cala and their respective ladies of honor, and it finishes with a childrens celebration in the town hall.

On the day of the Patron Saint of Mijas (8th September) and after the traditional floral offering to the Virgin, a procession of the image of the Virgin of the Rock is made from the parochial temple to its sanctuary, accompanied by the authorities, religious brotherhoods, associations and a large public crowd.

At the arrival of the Patron Saint at its sanctuary, there is a firework display, and another one to mark the end of the Feria.

Torremolinos: Last week in September

The festival of San Miguel Arcángel takes place during the last week in September, coinciding with the celebration of the Santo Patrón on September 29th. The annual Feria takes place in the town centre, and moves to the El Pozuelo Feria grounds at night. The Festival of San Miguel begins a week before a Romería that is considered to be one of the most important in Andalucía. More than 200,000 people gather together every year in the Los Manantiales pine woods to dance, sing and have a good time on the Día de San Miguel.

Jerez Fair

Feria del Caballo Jerez: First week in May

Jerez holds its May Horse Fair on the first week in May each year, a spectacular equestrian event, the Jerez Horse show takes place in the Gonzalez Hontoria Park. Some of the world's finest horses and riders compete in the endurance trials, coach driving, "pursuit and tumble" and dressage competitions with a stunning display of the finest horses of the region.

Cordoba: Last Week in May

Córdoba is living one of its grandest fiestas this month of May. In addition to the celebrations of the May Crosses and Patios, which have filled the city with colour, the Feria or Fair takes place in honour of Our Lady of Health. >From May 25 to June 2, thousands of locals and visitors will enjoy days full of happiness, dancing and good wine in the casetas or marquees installed in the Arenal fairground site. The casetas are a meeting place for friends and visitors in a city that is full of light and colour at this time of the year. There are horse riders too, the typical Córdoba peroles or saucepans, the rociero choir competitions and the competitions between casetas. All this awaits us in Córdoba, a city of monuments that is celebrating one of its happiest weeks in its festive calendar

Hidden Places On the Costa Del Sol.

There are many hidden secrets on the Costa Del Sol. We have included many within this brochure, so you may discover many more facets to the Costa Del Sol so all the family can enjoy their stay.

For those of you who wish to discover Rural Tourism, it is only a stones throw away. Istan is a beautiful White Village in the Mountains behind Marbella and Puerto Banus.

Istán is one of a number of villages of Moorish origin which owes its survival to its distance from the coast. After the Christian reconquest of the Iberian peninsula in the 15th Century, Arabs were barred from living within a league of the shoreline in order to prevent them from communicating with their kinsmen across the straits in Morocco. Istán, 15 kilometres inland, was allowed to remain while the coastal Arab settlements were depopulated and frequently destroyed.



That is not to say that the mountain villages were unmolested and left in peace. The post-reconquest years were turbulent ones which frequently erupted into violence which resulted in harsh and unforgiving repression for the remaining Moors. Istán was lucky. Two associated villages - Arboto and Daidin - were erased from the landscape so effectively that their precise locations are no longer known. Even so, the Arab population dwindled, and was largely replaced by Christian settlers from Castile and Murcia. So many came from the Murcian village of El Cristo de Panocho, that the people of Istán acquired a nickname - panochos - which has survived to this day.

The village is tucked away beneath the Sierra Blanca at the head of the valley of the rio Verde, close to the Serrania de Ronda hunting reserve. To reach it, leave the N-340 coastal highway 5 kilometres south of Marbella just beyond the Hotel Puente Romano.

As with so many mountain villages, creations of a time and place in which the only practical means of transport was the mule and the packhorse, Istán's streets are narrow and unsuited to the motor car. The only sensible way to experience it is on foot.

There are four à la carte restaurants in Istán, Troyano, El Baron, Rincon de Curro, Entresierras and the new Las Harales in the Rural Hotel at the entrance of the village. There are also bars that serve an excellent selection of tapas. It does boast one hotel, though it had to wait until 1998 to acquire it. Whether that heralds an influx of foreign visitors who may become the nucleus of a large expatriate community remains to be seen, but for the time being Istán remains closer to its roots than many of its cousins.

*The village aptly echoes night and day to the sound of water running constantly from its drinking fountains. It stands close to the huge reservoir created by the **Presa de la Concepción dam**, which was built in 1972 and provides drinking water to towns all along the coast. The water feeding Istán's fountains, however, is the pure, unprocessed mountain variety which was much prized long before the coming of the dam. Just outside the village, where it cascades freely from the rocks, motorists often stop to fill their jugs and cans.*

Very little remains of Moorish Istán, merely the crumbling remains of a tower hidden in a side street, but at least there is some, and the village still has the timeless air that outsiders find so appealing

Costa Del Sol Nightlife

Marbella

Ana María's

This traditional venue puts on a fun flamenco show that is foot-stomping and exhilarating. In the centre of Marbella's Old Town. Plaza de Santo Cristo.

Frank's Corner

For lovers of rock music, there is a stunning collection of memorabilia here. The club gets going around 10pm and is favoured by the mid-20s-30s. Outdoor terraces, plus indoor snooker and billiards. Central Marbella, near the Skol Hotel.

La Notte Piano Bar
